Baptism: What It Means to Be Cleansed

Why Must We Be Baptized?

When Jesus lived on Earth, He taught us important things we should do to follow God's plan. One of these things is called baptism. Baptism is like a special ceremony that shows our commitment to God.

We Must Be Baptized before We Can Receive the Gift of the Holy Ghost

After we are baptized, we can receive the Holy Ghost, which helps us feel close to God and gives us strength to do what's right. Baptism is like opening a door for the Holy Ghost to come into our lives and guide us.

We Must Be Baptized to Show Obedience

Even though Jesus never sinned, He still chose to be baptized to show us what we should do (Matthew 3:15). When we are baptized, we show that we want to do what Jesus asks of us. It's like saying "yes" to God's plan for our lives.

We Must Be Baptized to Enter Heaven

Jesus said that those who believe in Him and are baptized will inherit the kingdom of God. This means that baptism is really important for our future happiness with God.

Baptism at the Age of Accountability

When we are old enough to understand right from wrong, usually around eight years old, we can choose to be baptized. Babies don't need to be baptized because they are innocent and don't understand sin yet.

We Make Covenants When We Are Baptized

When we are baptized, we promise to follow Jesus and obey His commandments. In return, God promises to forgive our sins and bless us with His Spirit.

Baptism Gives Us a New Beginning
